Message from Mrs Horton

It really does seem as if Summer has arrived now. It was perfect weather for the first sailing lessons this week which our Year 5 and 6 pupils have enjoyed. Keeping your child safe online

ONLINE SAFETY

A reminder that social media platforms inc. WhatsApp, TikTok + Instagram have age restrictions of 13+ age And the school strongly advise that primary age children do not have accounts

(the NSPCC refers to social media like the Wild West because extreme & dangerous content is easily accessed, and children don't always understand meanings of words or impact of viewing)

All family devices should use Parental control and monitoring tools including Google Family Link, Apple ScreenTime and Microsoft Family Safety -

see https://parentsafe.lgfl.net - and ideally used in family spaces.

In addition, parents need to stay very involved, own the pin of all devices and regularly check the devices children are using.

Recommended Apps for Primary School Age:

For children aged 7–12, we recommend the following apps that combine education and entertainment:

- Scratch: A visual programming language that encourages kids to learn coding and express their creativity through interactive projects.
- Duolingo: This app makes language learning a fun and engaging experience, perfect for expanding linguistic horizons.
- Epic!: A digital library with thousands of books for kids, promoting a love of reading and exploration.
- Minecraft: A block-building game that encourages creativity, problem-solving, and teamwork.
- Zoombinis: This app enhances critical thinking and problem-solving skills through interactive puzzles and challenges.

These apps are not only entertaining but also educational, fostering a love of learning and creativity while maintaining a healthy balance in the digital world. We encourage families to explore these apps together, set reasonable time limits, and engage in conversations about responsible tech use to ensure a positive digital experience for children.

SIX TOP TIPS

For Parents To Keep Your Children Safe Online

SafeguardED

Most parents & carers think their children and young people spend too much time on devices. DON'T FEEL BAD! Lots of it is perfectly healthy anyway. Instead, follow these tips to keep them safe, happy and healthy.

Don't worry about screen time; aim for screen quality

Scrolling through social media isn't the same as making a film or story, or video calling Grandma. Use the Children's Commissioner's 'Digital Five A Day' to plan or review each day together.



Check the safety settings are turned on

Whether it's your home internet, mobile devices, consoles, apps or games, there are lots of settings to make them safer. The key ones are - can they chat to strangers, can they video chat or 'go live', are their posts public? What about safe search and Youtube? See parentsafe.lgfl.net for more.



Get your children to show you their apps and games

You don't need to know all about the latest app or game, but if your child shows you what they are doing and with whom, you'll probably see if it's appropriate or not. Remember 18 games are not more advanced – they are harmful to children! For parent guides to apps, including recommendations for kidsafe apps and video platforms, search for Common Sense Media reviews.



Don't try to hide news about scary things in the news

If you don't talk about it, your children might read inappropriate pages, believe scare stories or simply catastrophise in their heads. Why not watch Newsround together and talk about how they feel – there is guidance from Childline to help you.



Remind them of key online safety principles

There are too many to list, but remember human behaviour is the same online and offline. Remind your children to be a good friend, to ask for help if they are worried or if someone is mean, not to get undressed on camera and most important of all... if somebody tells them not to tell or ask for help because it's too late or they will get in trouble, THAT'S A LIE!

If you aren't sure, ASK!

Your school may be able to give you advice, but there are plenty of other places to ask for help as a parent or a child, whether it is advice or help to fix something. Lots of sites are listed at reporting.lgfl.net, including ones to tell your kids about (they might not want to talk to you in the first instance).



'Calm Corners'



Calm Corner

Each classroom at Hargrave Park has a Calm Corner. This is a space that all children are able to use. It is available for everyone. Some children may need to use the Calm Corner more than other children. Children who have SEN benefit from having access to a Calm Corner.

What is a 'Calm Corner'?

The Calm Corner is space within the classroom that children can use when they are feeling anxious or overwhelmed, when they need space and time to self-regulate their emotions or when they need time to have a brain-break and to reset. Calm Corners offer children a predictable space to help promote a sense of calm. When children feel safe and emotionally regulated, they are better able to engage in learning, focus on tasks and participate in activities. Some times it can also be a place to relax after finishing set tasks and learning activities.

What is in the 'Calm Corner'?

Each Calm corner in the school has different items. A Calm Corner may have sensory objects and items such as fidgets, squishy objects, weighted blankets, wobble cushions, soft cushions, puzzles, books, plasticine, items for colouring-in and drawing.

Each Class Teacher ensures that the children understand how to use the Calm Corner and know when it is appropriate to use the Calm Corner. Usually children only need to spend a short time in the Calm Corner and are then able to engage in their learning activity. A visual timer helps everyone to keep track of time.




























Attendance Matters

Did you know there are now 13 pupils who still have 100% attendance – that means they have attended school every day since September

There are also 88 pupils who have attendance between 96% and 99%

Best Class Attendance this week goes to...

Blue class
They have achieved 98.4% attendance this week.

We have had **179** pupils arrive late for school since September!

The total number of minutes late or missed minutes of learning is now a staggering 30,067

That is roughly **501** hours or equivalent to **77** ½ school days!




Our whole school theme continues to be explored – 'Patterns in nature'. Books and objects to handle including millions of years old ammonites and giant seed pods.

t: Start at the top. Go straight down, and round. Lift your pencil, and cross the 't'.


Practice at home!



Both pieces of work from Frida (left) and Manuela (right) pop with vibrant colour. It definitely enhances the presentation! Well done!









Relationships and Sex Education - summary

Friday 20th June

Relationships and Health Education are statutory subjects – all children will receive this education. We also offer one Sex Education lesson in KS1 and a few lessons in Years 5 and 6. These lessons are recommended by the DfE but are not statutory - more information has been sent out in letters to families. It was good to see families at the workshops that were held this week. RSE lessons this year will take place during the weeks beginning 30th June and 7th July.

If you are a parent of a KS1, Year 5 or Year 6 child and would like to withdraw them from the specific Sex Education lesson(s), then please read the letter when it is sent out and then speak to your child's teacher in the first instance.

We do not teach...

We do not teach puberty before KS2.

We do not teach Secondary content e.g. sexual health.

We do not teach different forms of sexual activity beyond human reproduction and how a baby is made.

We do not teach about pornography.

We do not teach about 'dating'.

We do not discuss anything personal in RSE lessons.

Non-statutory Sex Education content we teach:

KS1: Biological differences between male and female children.

Years 5 and 6: Human reproduction and how a baby is made.

Year 6: Understand that contraception can stop a baby from being made.

Year 6: Learn about some myths and misconceptions about HIV, who it affects and how it can and cannot be transmitted
